## **Cedar Valley Nature Trail Bike Ride Sept 24, 2022**

Let's celebrate the arrival of fall by riding the CVNT from Hiawatha to Urbana on Saturday, September 24. Meet at the trailhead on Boyson Road and be ready to roll at 10 AM. The 19-mile trip can be broken up into three segments: Hiawatha to Lafayette is seven miles, Lafayette to Center Point is six miles and it's another six miles to Urbana. If you want to shave three miles off you can start at County Home Road at 10:15 or you join the group at the Depot in Center Point about 11:30-11:45 for the ride to Urbana.

Several EISC members have ridden to Urbana on a couple of occasions. That segment of the trail has less shade with broader open spaces of prairie and wetlands. Perhaps we will be treated to seeing the four Sandhill Cranes that some riders got a chance to see and hear on August 22<sup>nd</sup> about a mile north of Center Point. That was an awesome, exciting experience.

The destination in Urbana will be Jams Coffee Bar at the end of the trail. That business will be celebrating their first anniversary on that day. A variety of snacks and beverages can be enjoyed on their large patio.

The ride back to Center Point is very enjoyable since nearly half of it is coasting downhill. The group can congregate at Bully's for brews and burgers.

The East Iowa Ski Club is headed for the Snowmass/Aspen ski areas, Jan 21 – 28, 2023. 24 fortunate EISC members will



be staying at the Top of the Village complex in four 3br/3bth ski-in/ski-out condos went quickly. The trip sold out quickly and a Wait List has been created. The great skiing at Snowmass is always enjoyable and the convenient, free shuttle service to the 3 other mountains Aspen, Aspen Highlands and Buttermilk make this a special destination. This trip has been priced as a drive yourself/carpool trip like other Colorado destinations. The club

has worked out a round trip airline ticket option into the Aspen airport at an extra cost, for those who would prefer to fly instead of drive. Some members are finding scheduling their own flights to Aspen to be more cost effective. The Trip Leader has pricing and additional details. For those who are signed up for the trip, please remember the 2<sup>nd</sup> payment is due at the EISC Fall Kick-Off Meeting, September 17<sup>th</sup>.



Kathy Takes and Kari Wheeler are the volunteer Trip Leaders & hosts on this great skiing adventure. If you did not get signed up before the trip sold out, please add your name to the Wait List. There is usually some cancellations and an opportunity to go on the trip. Currently there are 3 names on the Wait List.

At Snowmass we will be staying at the Top of the Village - the ultimate in ski-in ski-out condo lodging. There is a network of trails directly outside of the door and can literally ski right onto the slopes. Each unit has a fully equipped kitchen, fireplace, washer-dryer, gas grill, and private balcony or patio. The TOV offers an outdoor heated pool, two outdoor hot tubs, fitness room and sauna. The other 3 mountain resorts are very accessible. The Roaring Fork Transit Authority (RFTA) provides a FREE and extensive bus service within Aspen villages until 2 a.m. Below are some brief descriptions of the four mountains we will be skiing.

Snowmass is a massive resort with every type of terrain from serene to extreme. Aspen Mountain, with its famous black-diamond terrain, a variety of glades, bumps and steeps is always a favorite. Aspen Highlands has a 360-degree views of the Maroon Bells and an abundance of expert terrain as well as groomed cruisers and a cool European feel to the mountain. Buttermilk has the wide-open and gently rolling trails that cater to beginners and families.

The East Iowa Ski Club's Copper Mountain trip currently has 13 of the available 32 spots left for sale. If you are interested in joining us at Copper Mountain, please



contact Dale and Rhonda Bohrer as soon as possible to reserve your place on this ski adventure. The group will be staying in Mountain Plaza complex in the Center Village. The club has eight condos, 2br/2bth in this walk-in/walk-out location - across the plaza from the lifts (3-minute walk). For those already signed up, please note the 2<sup>nd</sup> payment is due at the EISC Fall Kick Off meeting, Sept. 17<sup>th</sup>.

This EISC trip is scheduled as a six night, Monday through Sunday, Feb 20 – 26; drive yourself/carpool trip. We have the option to park at the resort early Monday (2/20/23), ski all day and check in later that afternoon. This should work out great for those who want to travel to the Denver area on Sunday, then drive into Copper Mountain early for skiing on Monday morning and avoid the weekend traffic. The club got special group pricing on the condos with this unusual schedule and five of six-day lift tickets.



Copper Mountain is a 2,507-acre resort that has an excellent variety of naturally differentiated terrain that gets more challenging from west to east, and a seriously underrated high alpine filled with adventure terrain—plus a free Snow-cat ride to maximize your time there.

The resort has a huge variety of terrain spread across this large resort, so there are plenty of options for every level. Great, long groomers in both lower-intermediate and upper-intermediate ranges. Much more and better tree skiing than most people know. For those wanting to improve their skiing, Copper is one of the best resorts to learn to ski thanks to stellar learning programs, (slightly) lower prices, and a down-to-earth vibe that makes you want to hang a little longer.

The vibe at Copper is somehow simultaneously hip and refreshingly old-school: Go have some damn fun. Copper sees—and markets—itsself as the rebel force to the corporate imperial army down the road. It works.



Copper's guests enjoy steps away lodging, apres ski entertainment, naturally divided terrain, exciting events and a welcoming, knowledgeable staff. The base elevation is 9,712 feet and the summit is at 12,441 feet. There are over 140 marked trails (21% beginner, 25% intermediate, 36% advanced, 18% expert) and 24 chairlifts making Copper one of the largest ski resorts in Colorado.

The Mountain Plaza complex is known for its spacious and comfortable accommodations conveniently located at the base of the American Eagle Lift in the Center Village. On-site indoor and outdoor hot tubs, sauna, dining and a lobby warmed by its gas fireplace make Mountain Plaza a good choice to enjoy a relaxed mountain environment, while being steps away from skiing. The building, built in 1979, features complimentary wi-fi, heated underground parking and laundry facilities. One vehicle per unit with a kitchen receives garage parking. Additional vehicles may park in the free outlying lots or choose to pay for parking in the interior village lots.

Copper Mountain is on the Ikon Pass. Pass holders get unlimited access to the resort. The Copper Mountain trip currently has 16 spots left for the trip.

Monday was a non-fishing day, so some trip takers played golf, some rode bikes, and some explored the surrounding area.

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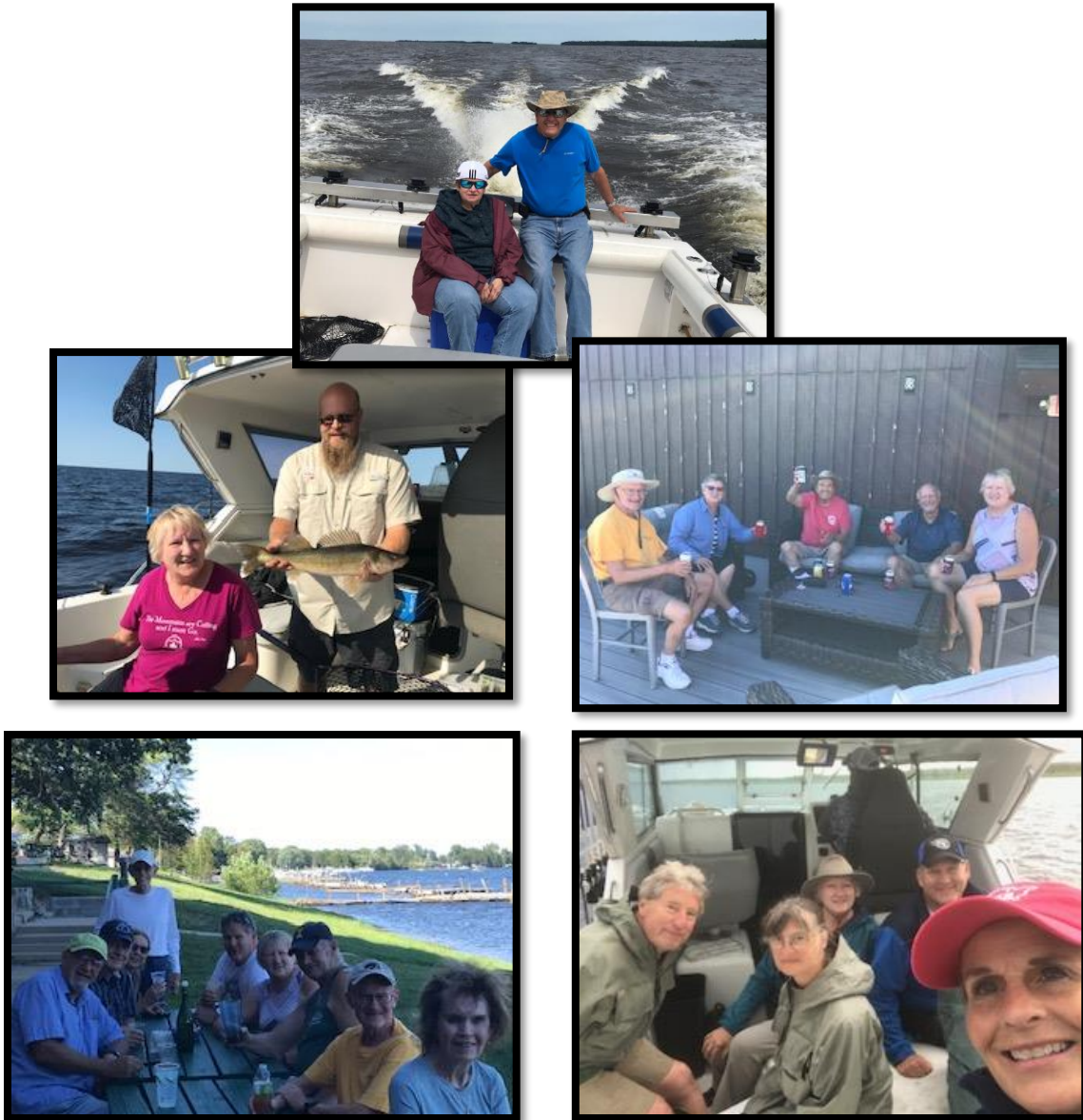

Friday was the end of our fishing days. After most of us enjoyed fresh walleyes for dinner on Thursday evening we went back out and filled out our walleye limits and most of our sauger limits. The prize bottles of wine awarded at dinner went to Rick Povey for a 25-inch walleye, the big pike bottle of wine (after a very well-played trick, for which I presented Janet with "Da Hook" at the corn roast), went to Kim Betts for a 35-inch fish.

Sportsman's Lodge treated us very well. They have a very nice facility. They have a breakfast area on the lower level, which did a great job for us every day, and very nice dining area for dinner on the main floor. The dining area overlooks the water, where we had excellent evening meals around two large tables set to seat us all.

On the non-fishing days those of us that were back at the lodge for lunch ate in the bar area, also overlooking the river where they served a variety of sandwiches including very tasty cheese burgers. There also is a rooftop patio at the lodge which turned out to be a popular hangout for some of us for an afternoon beer before dinner. Very comfortable, with a great view of the river and the boats coming in and going out. On the lower level the resort had a couple of picnic tables where we often gathered to talk about our success out on the lake, over a cocktail or glass of wine.

## **GUIDELINES FOR EAST IOWA SKI CLUB**

Whether you are a skier – downhill or X-C, snowboarder, bicyclist, kayaker, golfer, fisherman, hiker, or enjoy adventure/leisure tours, you will find exciting activities and tours geared to your interests and abilities with the East Iowa Ski Club. Join us and enjoy the camaraderie of some of the greatest people in this state. We guarantee a good time or double your efforts back!

**BECOMING A MEMBER:** To be member of the East Iowa Ski Club requires a completed membership form and the payment of annual dues. Our website is [eastiowaskiclub.com](http://eastiowaskiclub.com) and mailing address is East Iowa Ski Club, PO Box 843, Cedar Rapids, IA 52506-3162. Annual dues are good for 12 months from the date you joined or renewed:



- \$30 for an individual 18 years and over
  - \$60 for a household (everyone living in one household, including under 18)
  - \$5 for a one-time Trial membership, good for 3 months to new members only
- There are some events where membership is not necessary, however you are required to register. All guests sign in at every meeting.

#### **TO SIGN UP FOR AN ACTIVITY:**

1. Talk with the trip chairperson, sign up and arrange payment.
  2. On the website, log-in, select the activity from the event calendar and register.
- You can send a check to the PO Box or pay with a credit card online.

\* A full deposit or first payment must be made for your position to be held on the list of trip takers.

\* If the activity/trip chairperson takes your name but no money, you are on the waiting list only. The trip could sell out before you are contacted.

**WAITING LIST:** As trips fill, activity chairpersons accumulate additional names for a waiting list. The names are kept in order of receipt, and members are notified in that order when a vacancy occurs on the trip. We cannot guarantee spaces for people on the waiting list so get your money in early. You can accept a position that opens or decline, you are not under obligation.

**EVENT PRICES AND ROOM ARRANGEMENTS:** Your EISC works diligently to offer you the lowest trip rates obtainable. Please remember that all trip prices are subject to change. Sleeping arrangements in condos or hotels are normally one queen or 2 twins, we attempt to match up beds to couples/singles. For this reason, we advise you to come prepared with your roommate.

In the event you don't we will attempt to place you with a same sex roommate; however, it is not guaranteed. If you would prefer to room by yourself or don't have a roommate in mind, you have the option to pay the single supplement charge.

All trip takers look forward to their vacations and pay a lot of money to participate, SO in consideration of others, only paid trip participants are eligible to stay overnight in a condo/hotel.

**TRIP INSURANCE:** Insurance is recommended and available to purchase via the travel agency that design our ski trips, or it is also available from travel insurance websites.

**CROSS COUNTRY SKIING & SNOWSHOEING:** Trip chairpersons try to indicate the availability of cross country and snowshoeing trails. Please let the trip chairperson know if you intend to cross country and/or snowshoe.

#### **REFUND/CANCELLATION POLICY:**

\*Authorized cancellation: If a trip taker notifies the trip chairperson of intent to cancel before the deadline established for that trip, all monies paid will be refunded.

\*Late cancellation – If a trip taker cancels after the established cancellation date for the trip and notifies the trip chairperson, a refund MAY be eligible provided a fully paid replacement is found. If no replacement is found, the cancelling trip taker is responsible for unrecoverable costs.

\*Unauthorized cancellation – A person who does not notify the trip chairperson forfeits the cost of the trip.

**RESPECTABILITY:** An obligation for EISC membership – the EISC has members from all attitudes and ages of life. The Board therefore, feels it is important that considerations of respectability be given to all concerned when in travel or otherwise attending an event sponsored by the EISC. Others in attendance, though not members of our organization, also witness us as a group. When the activities of an individual infringe on the rights of the group as a whole, said actions are considered unacceptable. It is not out of the realm of possibility that your actions could prompt the board to revoke your membership.

**Summary:**

AS A MEMBER of the East Iowa Ski Club you will be entitled to a multitude of activities and advantages. Naturally, there are opportunities for friendship, places to go and people to see, but there is much more. Via our monthly newsletter, the Skiddoo, you will receive notices of all trips, parties, and other numerous events. You will know about what's happening in the club, who's doing what, with whom. Chances to buy, sell or trade, tips on clothing and exercises can be found via our website forums. You're eligible to attend all monthly meetings and events, summer activities such as kayak/canoe trips, bike rides, car cruises, etc. We've done them all!!!
