## Bike the Raccoon River Valley Trail - June 11-13



Let's hope everyone is ready for the EISC bicycle ride on the Raccoon River Valley Trail the weekend of June 11<sup>th</sup>-13<sup>th</sup>! This 2 day outing on the RRVT replaces the annual Cedar Falls area ride that **Wendall and Jane Sents** host. Fortunately, Wendall and Jane volunteered to be the EISC camping trip leaders for the RRVT ride. Wendall says he has a few electrical hook up spaces left of the loop of 12 campsites he reserved in the Saylorville camping area for the evenings of the bike ride, June 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>. These are large camp sites with plenty of room. Please contact Wendall if you would like to go camping for that weekend – his email is

<u>wsents@gmail.com</u> and cell # is 319-231-8072. The Saylorville campsite is about 20 miles from the Perry trailhead and is a fun place to camp even if you don't want to go on the bicycle ride. The EISC is using the Perry trailhead as a base for the RRVT ride.

We are out of EISC-held rooms at the historic Hotel Pattee, which is across the street from the trail head. Some members went onto the hotel's website and reserved one of the cool, themed rooms. <u>https://www.hotelpattee.com</u>. The historic property has 40 individually decorated and themed guest rooms, but may be full by now. The Hotel offers complimentary secure bicycle storage. They have a bike repair station, a tire pump in front of the hotel and some basic bike tools to fix a flat. Some members made their own motel reservations at a Super 8 motel in town at a more budget friendly rate. The RRVT is a flat looping trail that travels through miles of scenic lowa farmland and towns west and north of the Des Moines area. Most members will ride between the towns of Waukee and Perry, the 2 main trailheads and a popular stretch of the trail. You can ride any direction and return to your starting point. As on all EISC bicycle rides, everyone rides their own speed & can ride as much as you want. The trail keeps the railroad theme with the signs and old depots turned into trailheads in many of the towns.

On that Friday afternoon of June 11<sup>th</sup> a number of members plan to ride the High Trestle Bridge Trail on their way in. Starting at the Woodward trailhead - it is only a few miles from the Perry. A short ride to the bridge or into Madrid or Sheldahl, where there are some fun places to stop and rest...which sounds like a fine idea to me. ### Maguoketa River Float - July 31

On July 31, we will float the Maquoketa River. The float will start at Monticello Canoe Rental's office, just below the Mon-Maq Dam in Monticello, and will end at Pictured Rocks Park. They offer rentals for canoes, kayaks, and Inner Tubes. The float is approximately 8 miles and usually takes between 3-5 hours to paddle by canoe or kayak. These times will vary depending on the water levels and number of stops we make during the float.

•17 ft metal canoe rental is \$40



•10 ft kayak rental is \$25 (regular or sit on top - you must specify at time of reservation which type you want

•Cooler tube rentals are \$15 – to put your beverage cooler on.

If you want to use your own kayak or canoe, you drive directly to the launch site at 21430 River Road, Monticello, and unload your boat <u>no later than 9:30 am</u>. Go to the window and pay \$10 per person. You then follow a shuttle vehicle to the take out point where you leave your vehicle, and then ride back to the starting point in the shuttle vehicle. If there are more than six, we will likely get a reduced cost and MCR would like to know a day or two in advance as to how many that might be. So please email me and let me know you're going, and that you're taking your own boat, so I can let them know.

All military members (past & present) will receive a discounted rate with proof of military ID. All rentals are paid in full in advance. 319-465-3697. You can cancel 48 hours before your scheduled float (July 31) for a full refund. After this, no refunds. Check their website for

FULL DETAILS: <u>https://www.monticellocanoerental.com/</u> If you want to go on this trip, you need to call Monticello Canoe Rental 319-465-3697 and reserve/pay for your canoe/kayak on your credit card. Tell them you are with the EISC group and will be taking the shuttle ride at 10 am. There is no limit on how many of us can sign up, just keep in mind, MCR has a limit on how many people can go out, so the longer you wait to reserve, the less likely you are to get a canoe/kayak. Then email me (Cathy) at dickster41@gmail.com and let me know you are going so I know who to wait for at the shuttle lot.

We will need to arrive at their rural shuttle lot first, at 12521 – 190th St., Monticello, IA 52310 (out a bit past Camp Courageous) and we will all need to be there by 10 am. We leave our cars in a big, grassy lot, then they bus us with all of our stuff to the starting point, where we finalize our reservation, sign a waiver, etc. Then we grab our canoes/kayaks on the beach and set off for the float. I have done this float several times over the years, and I like to bring a small cooler with drinks and a sandwich, and I also bring a dry bag to put snacks, cell phone, car keys, etc. in. Most of the sit-on-top kayaks have at least one bungee cord to put a very small cooler under, or a dry bag, or whatever. I don't remember if the sit-in kayaks have any type of bungee cord. 

Afterward, visit the Glen Canyon Dam, holding back the waters of the Colorado River in Lake Powell, the country's second-largest man-made lake. #### DAY 8 ST. GEORGE-SNOW CANYON STATE PARK-LAS VEGAS



# "Sailing Maine on the Angelique" - Aug 29-Sep 5, 2021

There is nothing like flying along the water under full sail with no engine sounds, just the wind in the sails and the slap of waves. That's what several of your fellow members will be experiencing as we sail around the islands off the shores of Maine on the tall ship '*Angelique'*. Built in 1980, this majestic windjammer is a 95 foot, Cruise Ketch-type ship, resembling an English fishing trawler from the late 1800s. The trip will be Sunday, August 29 through Sunday, September 5, 2021.



The vacation begins with a night dockside in picturesque Camden Harbor staying at a hotel on the harbor. The next morning, a hearty breakfast is served on board and Angelique leaves her berth in Camden's inner harbor with the first tide. Sailing for 5 nights/days on the Windjammer with the last day in the tall ship regatta of the **Camden Windjammer Festival**.

Each day is a new landfall, with a few possible stops: the beach of an uninhabited island where we spend an evening eating lobster around a campfire, an island village with a few crafts studios and an ice cream stand, EB White's boathouse where he wrote his books. In addition, an island clambake is a staple feature of almost all Windjammer cruises. Enjoy long summer evenings with a glorious sunset.

Shore stops are not the main events. Relaxation and fun is what sailing on the Angelique is all about. Have you ever been on a ship where the passengers are allowed and encouraged to jump overboard! A fantastic way to start the day while anchored in a cove or off an island, you get the opportunity to go for a swim. Just jump into the ocean and swim. Later are chances to explore islands while anchored and get some good exercise and take some photos of the area. While on board, learn anything you want to know about sailing, and much more. Everyone is encouraged to interact with the crew. Ask the captain for a chance to steer the ship. Discuss recipes with the cook...all things are welcomed and fun.



# Breckenridge, CO - Feb 5-12, 2022

# Breckenridge Trip Cost: \$700 Land Only – \$350 sign up / \$350 Sept. 18 / cancellation date Oct. 16 / use Epic Local Pass, Epic Summit Pass or Epic Day Passes - instead of lift tickets

The first major EISC West trip of the 2022 season is Back to Breckenridge! The EISC is very fortunate to have Trip Leaders Kathv Takes and Steve Simmen volunteer to guide us on this great ski adventure. Breckenridge is a popular ski and vacation destination for the club and we have room for 32 members (8 2br/2bth suites) staying at the Beaver Run resort. This ski in/ski out resort complex is located on the mountain at Peak 9. On the last trip to Breck the EISC was able to handle all aspects of the trip (lodging, transportation. lifts) – this year will require member input. Vail resorts has priced lift tickets

excessively high in order to sell Epic passes. The EISC has decided not to include lift tickets and refer our members to either the Epic Day Pass, Epic Base or Summit Pass or the Epic Local pass options. The differences are described in the Ski Pass article in this newsletter. We have realize that most members prefer to drive to Summit County resorts rather than fly to Colorado, so this will be a drive yourself trip as well. Flights are available to Denver for members who prefer to fly and book their own flights. Arranging an Epic Mountain Shuttle to the resort for around \$56 per person each way is an option on the Epic pass website.

With more than 2,908 acres of skiing terrain for all levels, Breckenridge is one of the most popular ski resorts in Colorado. Beginner skiers can comfortably learn to ski at the base of Peak 8 and 9, while intermediates have their pick of groomed runs at Breckenridge, as well as intermediate bowls from the new Peak 6 terrain. Expert skiers can ski challenging lines off of the summit or Peak. With 5 peaks, 187 trails, 2,908 acres and the highest lift-served terrain, Breck has something for everyone. The Vertical Drop is 3,398 ft.; the Elevation (Summit) is 12,998 ft. and Elevation (Base) is 9,600 ft. There are 187 trails and the longest trail is 4 O'clock at 3.5 miles. The altitude is sometimes a challenge for our members at Breck. We have learned it is better to stay hydrated with lots of water rather than beer at this altitude.

The Beaver Run Resort is one of Breckenridge's most popular ski-in/ski-out properties. It offers a variety of amenities including an indoor/outdoor heated pool, a second outdoor pool, nine outdoor hot tubs, an exercise room, video arcade, retail stores, mini market/deli, bars and restaurants, ski and snowboard rental shops and complimentary intown shuttle. Parking is restricted during the winter to 1 vehicle per bedroom at a \$20 per day fee.

The Breckenridge trip will go on sale at the Spring Picnic meeting on June 5<sup>th</sup>.

The Breckenridge Trip Cost is:

\$700 Land Only – \$350 sign up / \$350 Sept. 18 / Epic Local Pass, Epic Summit Pass or Epic Day Passes - instead of lift tickets.

EISC members will have to order the Epic passes online. The EISC recommends using the SKI.com link <u>https://epicikon.events.ski.com/</u> to buy your pass as SKI.com offers a credit of \$30 on all Epic (except the Epic Day) Passes, when used on one of the EISC trips. All Epic Passes are currently selling at 20% less than last year. Options & costs in the Ski Pass article are in this newsletter. Be sure and sign up early for what is sure to be a fantastic EISC skiing adventure.

# May SKI.com Epic and Ikon pass deals

EISC Members, SKI.com is still offering deals on Epic and Ikon passes. If you are planning to go on the EISC ski trips, the Epic pass may offer the best options. We announced the 2 West trips for 2022. Feb 5-12 the EISC will be in **Breckenridge**, CO. The Epic Local, Epic Summit or Epic Day passes will work at Breckenridge at a much lower cost than lift tickets. Mar 5-12 the EISC will be at Zermatt, Utah a Swiss village in the Heber Valley. There are free daily shuttles to Deer Valley, Sundance and Park **City**. The Epic Local or Epic Day passes will work at Park City. If you are going on both club trips or one club trip and another trip to an Epic resort, the Epic Local Pass or Epic Dav passes are a good decision. If you are only going on one club trip, you may want to consider Epic Day passes for the days you want to ski. All Epic passes are on sale 20% lower than last season. If the Epic Local or Base passes are purchased using the SKI.com link below and used on an EISC trip, there will be an additional \$30 credit from SKI.com.



The cost of the **EPIC Local Pass is \$583**. It is unlimited skiing at 26 destinations including **Breckenridge**, Keystone & Crested Butte / Holiday blackout day skiing at **Park City**, (not during the EISC trip), Heavenly, Northstar, Kirkwood / 10 days w/ holiday blackout date skiing at Vail, Beaver Creek, Whistler Blackcomb, among others.

The cost of the **Summit Value pass is \$471**. It is unlimited skiing at Keystone and holiday blackout date skiing at **Breckenridge** only. The Epic Day passes offers restricted and unrestricted access to most Epic resorts – the restricted access would not affect the EISC trips. The cost of the restricted Epic Day pass is Epic 1-Day Restricted Pass Adult: **\$87** / Epic 2-Day Restricted Pass Adult: **\$171** / Epic 3-Day Restricted Pass Adult: **\$249** / Epic 4-Day Restricted Pass Adult: **\$323** / Epic 5-Day Restricted Pass Adult: **\$392**.

Please read the pass details and all restrictions carefully before purchasing any type of pass.

For cost comparison – the group lift ticket prices at **Breckenridge** are priced so high the club decided not to offer them. Epic is incentivizing people to buy the Epic passes. Group lift ticket prices are below:

4 day \$556 5 day \$660 6 day \$750 No senior lift tickets at **Breckenridge**. Plus 4% lift ticket tax.

The restricted Epic Day passes work best if you are not buying the Epic Local or Summit passes. If you are planning on going on both trips or doing any additional skiing the Epic Local pass may make the most sense.
